Sample Boston Itinerary

Morning:

Start your morning on the famous 'Newbury Street' and grab breakfast at one of my favorite spots in the city '<u>Joe's on Newbury</u>'.

After breakfast walk down Newbury Street and explore its upscale boutiques, art galleries, and trendy cafes.

Eventually you will walk right into the Public Gardens, known for its lush greenery, vibrant floral displays, and iconic Swan Boats (you can do a <u>Swan Boat tour</u>). Established in 1837, it is the oldest public botanical garden in the United States!

Continue walking through the Public Gardens and you will make it to the Boston Commons. Head towards Frog Pond which is great for kids (playground across the way).

Once you have made it through the Boston Commons, head towards the <u>Granary Burying Ground</u>, a historic cemetery. Established in 1660, it is one of the city's oldest burial grounds and is the final resting place of several prominent figures from American history, including Paul Revere, John Hancock, Samuel Adams, and many victims of the Boston Massacre. There should be someone dressed up at the entrance who will give you a map of the famous headstones in the burial site!

Across the street stop by the Omni Parker House (hotel) and grab a Boston Cream Pie. This is the home of the original Boston Cream Pie established in 1856.

Afternoon:

After you enjoyed your Boston Cream Pie, head towards the <u>Old State House</u>. Dating back to 1713, it holds significant historical importance as one of the city's oldest public buildings and a pivotal site during the American Revolution, hosting events like the reading of the Declaration of Independence.

Continue walking towards <u>Faneuil Hall / Quincy Market</u> which is known for its vibrant atmosphere! Here you will be able to see local artists, shop and enjoy endless food options. I recommended walking through the Faneuil Hall to see all the food options before deciding what to eat. <u>Here</u> is an insider look at some of your options.

After lunch take a stroll towards 'Bell in Hand' which is one of the oldest taverns in the United States, dating back to 1795. It has a rich history and was frequented by prominent figures like Paul Revere!

Evening:

Head over to Boston's Famous North End aka Little Italy. Wander along Hanover Street, where a plethora of authentic Italian restaurants, bakeries, and cafes await, offering a delightful array of culinary delights and treats to indulge in.

A few blocks down you can stop by '<u>The Paul Revere House</u>' located at 19 North Square. Take the tour and step back in time!

After the tour, it's time to grab dinner at what is known as the BEST Lobster Roll in Boston, Neptune Oyster House. They do NOT take reservations however you can walk over and get your name on the list. Depending on date and time you can have upwards of a 1-2 hour wait but I promise it will be worth it!

Once you've indulged in endless seafood, walk back to Hanover Street and get ready for dessert. Boston is known for its cannolis! There are two famous cannoli shops: Mike's Pastry and Modern Pastry (BOTH ARE CASH ONLY). I recommended getting one cannoli from each shop and you can decide which is better!

Please note it is difficult to eat inside of these locations as there will most likely be a lot of people. I recommend getting the cannolis to go and walk towards Rose Kennedy Greenway where you can find tables and swings!
